There happens to be an inspired physician. He can find and remove any malignancies. You know where to find Him. Open up your healthcare provider's book. But here's the thing. It all starts with making an appointment. And the gift I spoke of earlier... our pain calls us to get help, to live differently and healthier.

Maybe it's been some time since you called on the lover of your soul. He is present and only a breath away. Summer is the time when we tend to take a break and get away if we can afford to. Wherever you find yourself in the months ahead know this; there isn't a place you can go that He is not there. And if you have been given the gift of pain, that is, knowing something needs to change, well. Then you're in a good place. My experience continues to be that whatever I am unable to do for myself, He got it! He either changes my circumstances or transforms me within the events themselves! On average, it is the latter. He inspires me to live differently. I couldn't be more grateful.

Blessed are the Chosen



In Matthew 5-7 Jesus delivers His famous Sermon on the Mount. It starts off with what is known as the beatitudes. From May 8 through June 26 we are viewing the Chosen Series Two in the Fellowship Hall of our church building. Each episode focuses on one of the beatitudes. However, in the unique style of The Chosen, the episode does not explicitly depict the beatitude in the scenes. The message is sublime but prevalent.

The first episode is titled Thunder and focuses on the lives of James and John, the Sons of Thunder, as Jesus named them. The Beatitude that is the focus is:

Blessed Are the Poor in Spirit. We can see ourselves in their attitudes and "shoot from the hip" desire to see justice prevail at any cost. They are reactive and don't really think things through before attempting to act and "fix" the situation at hand. However, Jesus, knowing all things, is patient but determined to teach them how a "Jesus follower" should act in humility.

The series teaches important life lessons that we explore in a discussion after each episode. Consider joining us every Wednesday at the church where we are viewing and discussing Season Two of The Chosen.

If you have never experienced The Chosen, you can visit the viewing and discussion of Season One at the home of Vickie Ortiz where Pastor Vin is facilitating that group. It is a very powerful introduction to The Chosen and to Christianity in general. There is so much to gain by watching a video of scenes that you may have read in the Bible but didn't get the full impact just from reading.

All seasons of The Chosen portray Jesus and the disciples as well as other familiar characters in a very unique light. The scenes make the Bible stories come alive and impact our lives.

A TALE OF TWO PORTRAITS



One of my favorite paintings by the artist Warner Sallman is called "The Lord is My Shepherd." This famous painting is a depiction of Psalm 23, where Jesus is the Shepherd, caring for his flock; he holds a lamb in his arms while the rest of the flock gathers about him, protected and happy. The setting is bucolic; it is all green pastures and still waters. It is a perfect summertime painting, with warm sunshine and peaceful subjects. Although you can locate the Valley in the distance of the painting, there is no trace of the shadow of death in the foreground.

This painting reminds me of why we hold Psalm 23 close to our hearts. Along with the Ten Commandments and the Lord's

Prayer, Psalm 23 is a passage that countless numbers of Christians have devoted to memory, and for good reason. It is a staple text at many Christian funerals and memorials because this short passage succinctly describes the care and compassion God has for us all through our lives, and his care continues even through death. Christians see the ultimate fulfillment of Psalm 23 in Jesus Christ, who in John chapter 10, declared "I am the Good Shepherd; the good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." When these two passages meet, we begin to understand how God's care for us works, and what it costs.

First, understanding the cost helps us to read Psalm 23 in a different light. Take for instance this verse (from the KJV): "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." It is precisely because Jesus Christ suffered, died, was buried, and rose again that we as Christians can face the darkness in our lives with comfort and resolve. Jesus has gone through the crisis of death and has come out the other side victorious. The Gospel is not a "pie in the sky" message for comfort in the hereafter; the Gospel leads us through the crises of our lives because Christ went through it, and travels with us.

Second, once we have figured the cost, we understand in part how God's care for us operates. I just mentioned that Christ travels with us; Psalm 23 ends with the verse "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life," a verse that speaks of goodness and mercy traveling with us. To be more accurate, however, the word that we translate as "follow" more precisely means "pursue." The Complete Jewish Bible translation (CJB) has it as "Goodness and grace will pursue me every day of my life." In Luke 15, Jesus told the Pharisees and teachers of the Law a parable of a shepherd who leaves 99 sheep in open country to find a single lost sheep. That is a portrait of God's care in action: he pursues those who are lost with single-minded determination.

This brings me to another portrait of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. It is a painting by Thomas Cole from 1848, and it is a representation of the parable from Luke 15. You see the Good Shepherd, but he is not towering over his sheep as in the previous painting; he is in the distance, leading a single sheep with a short rope, back to the fold. I like to take in the two portraits together: A caring shepherd at home with his sheep, but also one who joyfully will go out to bring home that one sheep who lost their way.


